#### ANTIPODEANS 2017 - PART 3

Hey everybody, it's Oscar and Jacqui from the Antips crew. The next part of our adventure was crossing the border into Vietnam. Our first stop was Ho Chi Minh City, known as Saigon to the locals. After the eight-hour bus ride from Phnom Penh, everyone was extremely relieved to check in to our hotel. After everyone settled into their rooms, we decided to head over to a market just across the street for lunch. Once we had all eaten, we relaxed in the nearby park, playing a game with a kickable shuttlecock. This was a popular game among the locals and many of them started joining in, giving us a great feel for the city. The next day we headed to the War Remnants Museum, where we learnt about the Vietnam War and the atrocities that took place during that time. There were many exhibitions including one showing many of the weapons and traps used in the war and another showing the affects of Agent Orange on the Vietnamese people. Learning about the war was both extremely interesting and confronting. That afternoon, we had another opportunity to relax and explore the city before we headed to the Ben Tanh Markets after dinner. With yet another night of successful (and excessive) shopping behind us, we all headed to bed ready for our final day in Ho Chi Minh.





Our last day in Ho Chi Minh began with a three-hour bus ride to the Cu Chi Tunnels. Here, we were given a guided tour and learnt about the tunnel system and how it was used to out-smart enemies of the Vietnamese during the war. We were shown hidden traps, entrances to the tunnel, some of which we were too small to fit in, and finally, we were able to walk (or rather, crawl) through the small, dimly lit tunnels. Due to the tunnels being a massive total of 250km, we were unable to walk their entire length, but managed to complete a small section. Once we arrived back at our hotel, we headed out to dinner and decided to walk to the Bitexco Tower we had read about earlier that day. When we arrived at the Tower we discovered it had a sky deck with a 360-degree view of the city. This was an incredible experience we will always remember, and a great way to end our adventure in Ho Chi Minh City

The next phase of the trip was the Dalat Trek. This was our second and final trek for the trip. It was a seven-hour bus ride from Ho Chi Minh City to Dalat but we were lucky enough to have booked a sleeper bus (a bus with beds rather than seats) which everybody thoroughly enjoyed and took advantage of. We were told that Dalat was a small country town, however, when we arrived we found it was really a bustling city with a fantastic vibe. That evening we had a quick look at the night markets before heading to bed to get a good night sleep before the restless nights ahead.



With our bags packed and a quick breakfast we prepared ourselves for what we knew was going to be a challenge. Our first day of the trek was a 12km walk past pine trees and up and down hills with beautiful views. After a tiring first day, the team was glad to arrive at our first campsite. That night we played games and relived the memories we'd made so far. The next day was much the same as the first: 12km, up and down hills, but this time with the addition of coffee plantations along the way. We walked at a steady pace, arriving at the campsite early afternoon. This gave us time to relax and head down to the nearby waterfall for some much-needed water therapy. Despite the water feeling like it was below freezing, it was muchly appreciated by the whole team. We spent the night playing games and telling stories until we retired to our tents for the night. The 3rd day, the team woke with sore muscles but pushed through the day regardless. The day was similar to the first two days with the addition of water buffaloes and river crossings.

That night, having walked 36km so far, everybody was exhausted and glad we had only one day left. After our trek guides treated us to roasted marshmallows for dessert, we headed to bed, ready for the hardest and final day of the trek. The next morning was Easter Sunday. The team woke up both excited to finish off the trek but also sad it was coming to an end. As we moved out of our tents we noticed small piles of 'Easter eggs' (mentos) in front of our tents. This lifted the mood and energy of the whole team and we were very thankful the Easter Bunny remembered us. It was time to start our final walk. The day was 10km with lots of hills. One hill we will never forget seemed almost vertical, however, we helped one another to the top and conquered the hill together. As we got to the end of the trek and saw the truck waiting to pick us up it was an overall feeling of relief and accomplishment throughout the group. It was an incredible experience and nearly everybody saw it as a huge highlight of the trip. It gave us the opportunity to bond and come together as a team, as well as experience remote parts of Vietnam off the tourist beaten track.

## **SUBJECT IN FOCUS - HUMANITIES**

Humanities incorporates the subjects of English, History and Geography. Most Humanities classes have the same teacher for all subjects, but some classes have one teacher for English and another for History and Geography. All students would undertake at least one novel study in English at some stage during the year. In addition, we have an exciting new online literacy program, *Wordflyers*, which some students have already used and all students in 7-9 will undertake before the end of the year. The Year 7 History curriculum looks at the ancient world with the Year 8 curriculum moving on to the medieval period. Below is a summary of what each class is currently studying.

## SUBJECT IN FOCUS - HUMANITIES

8E have been studying Viking life in their History and English classes. In English, they studied the novel *They Came on Viking Ships* by Jackie French. From this they developed an awareness of the Viking customs through the eyes of a young girl by closely examining the raids and explorations conducted during this period of time. In their History lessons, students examined Viking beliefs and religious customs; the desire to explore new lands and the reasons behind this and their tactics and strate-gies when going in battle. From this, students had an opportunity to develop a diorama that depicted the Viking Era. Students spent several lessons working in groups and at the completion of the unit they invited staff and students to visit their class-room where their finished work was on display. Staff and students can view 8E's work as it will be on display in the Library for several weeks.

Many students have used different types of technology to help them improve including: Heart Rate monitors, GPS trackers and a variety of different mobile apps. One app that has become popular is STRAVA. Students are able to run against their peers and other members of the school who have the app and run the same run. The best thing about this app is that there are 'segments' you can run against. For example, during our school run, there is a segment that runs from the back of the ovals to the edge of the footpath. Students can then aim to beat their time or their friend's time for either a segment, or the entire lap. This has promoted lots of conversations in many different contexts. This run is also available to



members of the community, who can then make the leader board. Segments can be found anywhere once they have been created.


every task and challenge that he is presented with to the best of his ability. What a fantastic role model, well done Toby.
